Yes, there is a stream within 50 feet of the southern border, by the southeast corner that flows into a piped stream. The piped stream is conveyed on-site along the south boundary line. The stream daylights within the southwest corner of the site before entering another conveyance pipe and exiting the site. The stream again daylights 190 feet west of the of the property. It eventually flows into the Picnic Point Creek.

The proposed project is to replace and remove parts of the piped stream.
