BE SAFE AND SMART!

We Washingtonians love our fresh air. Many of us enjoy socializing with family and friends around a campfire. Some even appreciate the use of fire for ceremonial purposes. These fires shall meet the requirements of the City of Mukilteo fire code which requires, but is not limited, to the following conditions:

- **CONSTANTLY ATTENDED**
- **USE ONLY NATURAL-CUT, CLEAN, DRY WOOD**
- **SMALLER THAN THREE FEET WIDE AND TWO FEET TALL**
- **PROVIDE MEANS FOR FIRE EXTINGUISHMENT**

PUBLIC -USE OPTION

The City of Mukilteo provides seasonal fire pits at various locations at Lighthouse Park for public-use.

When a red flag warning is in effect, or when weather conditions make burning unsafe, the City of Mukilteo may enact a ban on outdoor burning in conjunction with Snohomish County. To determine if a burn ban is in effect, visit

KNOW THE REGULATIONS!

When air quality conditions are poor, the Puget Sound Clean Air Agency may enact a ban on both indoor and outdoor burning. To determine if an air quality burn ban is in effect, call 1.800.595.4341 or visit their web site www.pscleanair.org. If the fire department determines that your fire constitutes a hazard, the fire department will have you extinguish your fire. Complaints regarding smoke or other air quality concern should be directed to Puget Sound Clean Air Agency at pscleanair.gov/262/File-a-Complaint or 1.800. 552-3565.



Chat With Your Neighbor First...

If you have a neighbor that produces visible smoke caused by indoor burning, you should first attempt to address the issue with your neighbor personally. This conversation should be polite, even friendly. It can begin with a statement like, “I’m not sure you’re aware...” The person creating the harmful smoke may not recognize that the smoke they produce penetrates your house or causes you harm. Briefly explain the smoke issue, and ask the neighbor to refrain from producing harmful smoke. Good neighbors create strong communities and knowing how to resolve conflicts amicably is essential for building strong neighbor relationships. Please be a good neighbor. Keep fires safe and remember everyone has the right to our fresh, clean air.
