assist citizens in understanding information on this website in a variety of foreign languages.

The City of Mukilteo also provides visitors to City Hall the opportunity to access an Interpreter using LanguageLine Solutions. LanguageLine Solutions' Interpreters are available in more than 240 languages and American Sign Language, 24 hours a day, seven days a week to communicate with limited English proficient or Deaf or Hard-of-Hearing individuals.

Interested parties that are limited English proficient are able to readily access and understand announcements published on the City website using Google Translate.

The City of Mukilteo routinely provides public announcements on the City website such as meetings, hearings and project notices. The City of Mukilteo has a translation feature on the City website powered by Google Translate to assist citizens in understanding information on this website in a variety of foreign languages.

Outreach materials are also posted on the City website and updated frequently. Materials are not provided in other languages, however the translation feature Google Translate on the City website allows written materials to be translated into a variety of languages.

The City began using LanguageLine in December of 2017. Between April 2019 and March 2020, there were 2 calls for these languages: 1 Mandarin and 1 Korean.
