




To the Community, City Council and City Staff
March 1, 2018

My monthly report on our city, ensuring that I remain accountable and connected to our community. 



Since my last report, I can share that the 2018 legislative session was a success for Mukilteo. \$257,000 was granted as part of the Capital Budget for waterfront redevelopment work. This money will help us prepare the city owned sites for redevelopment as parkspace and mixed use space, as envisioned in the [Downtown Waterfront Master Plan](#). We are hopeful that we will also receive dollars in the Supplemental Capital Budget: currently there is \$400,000 for the Mukilteo Peace Park in the House and Senate proposals.

1 The Boys and Girls Club celebrated a groundbreaking of their new site along 47th Place West. The new facility will include ball-fields, classroom spaces and a gym. The City donated \$500,000 for the project, and facilitated grant applications at the state level.

2 Mayor Gregerson, Council Vice President Cook and Councilmember Rohrbough welcomed several students from Leadership Launch to City Hall. They learned about city government, had a tour of city hall, and discussed leadership journeys.

3 Public Works Street crew worked to repair potholes near Endeavour Elementary. Effective maintenance of our streets and sidewalks is an element of the [2018 Action Agenda](#), as the City works to deliver Proposition 1 projects on time, as promised to the voters.

4 Public Works stormwater crews work on a drainage project, ensuring compliance with our federal pollution discharge permit, as well as ensuring that we are taking good care of

our environment.

5 Boy Scout Troop 189 visited the Police Station and heard from Officer Jones about police work. Community connections with our police department is an ongoing goal, and part of the [2017 Action Agenda](#).

6 Mayor Gregerson visited Olympia for an Association of Washington Cities Mayor's Exchange. This opportunity allowed for information and idea sharing, as well as a presentation from Governor Inslee. The Mayor also participated in a Results Washington forum which discussed housing and homelessness challenges, and current efforts throughout the state. She serves as the Chair of a countywide coalition, the Alliance for Housing Affordability, which is working towards establishing a Housing Trust Fund to provide funding for new projects in the County. Participating in solutions to the crisis of housing affordability is a [2018 Action Agenda](#) item.

7 Fire Marshal Ru-

dikoff conducted the final visit to a Mukilteo second grade classroom, bringing a message of fire prevention and safety to all of Mukilteo's second graders. Emergency preparedness is an ongoing goal of the City, and was a [2017 Action Agenda](#) item.

8 Chief Kang took time to have lunch at Mukilteo Elementary, providing a friendly face to these young students.

9 Public Works stormwater crews repair a catch basin near 8th Street this month, ensuring a functioning system.

10 Public Works streets crews repair a sidewalk repair along 92nd Street, ensuring we continue to have safe places to bike and walk in Mukilteo, and supporting a [2018 Action Agenda](#) goal of effectively maintaining our infrastructure.

11 New floors were installed in Rosehill's Pointe Elliott room this month, updating the damaged floors in our community center.

12 Seniors enjoyed a holiday sock hop at Rosehill Community Center. Ongoing increased programming reflects a commitment from a [2016 Action Agenda](#) item.
